From the Pastor's Desk

In my reading lately three words have recurred repeatedly: retribution, reconciliation, and reparations. Perhaps these are not the 3 Rs you remember from elementary school, but they are worthy of consideration as we seek to be faithful disciples in a fractured and fractious world.

Retribution has to do with getting even for a wrong done; its roots are in that Old Testament verse that sanctions "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." It is the source of much pain and suffering! In the Middle East, retribution continues to perpetuate conflict and violence across generations. Most recently, the terrorist attack by Hamas on innocent Israelis gave rise to retribution by the Israeli government that far exceeded the scope of the original attack, with over 40,000 Palestinian deaths including thousands of children. Homes and neighborhoods have been leveled; hospitals have been bombed, and hundreds of thousands of Palestinians have been displaced. Just as Hamas should be distinguished from the Palestinians (most are not Hamas), so the Israeli government should be distinguished from all Israelis as there are significant voices in Israel condemning the government's actions. The Israeli government has justified this violent retribution on the basis of Hamas' attack and a need to exterminate Hamas. Lost on them is that in seeking retribution, they are sowing the

seeds of future violence among yet another generation of Palestinians who have been violently displaced and bombed and may seek their own violent retribution in the future.

Jesus offers an alternative to retribution – reconciliation. He rejects the "eye for an eye and tooth for a tooth" mentality in favor of forgiveness and turning the other cheek. In our modern world, many reject that approach as overly idealistic and unrealistic, but Jesus seems to think it is faithful to who God calls us to be. Reconciliation seeks to break the cycles of violence and hate that are so much a part of retribution. It begins with recognizing our common humanity and seeks common ground upon which to build relationships. God calls us to that reconciling work, but it is hard work!

Reparations acknowledge that sometimes it is not enough to simply say, "I'm sorry." Sometimes more is needed to right the wrongs of the past. We are much better at recognizing that need when we are the ones wronged than when we are those who have done the wrong. And determining what reparations are appropriate is often difficult. Currently there is debate about what reparations might be appropriate for the wrongs done to Black and indigenous peoples in our nation across the years. The stain of slavery, discrimination, and racism are not only sins of our past, but have placed subsequent generations at an economic and social disadvantage as compared to those who benefited from racist structures. What was done was wrong! But figuring

out what should be done to right the wrong is hard!

Where then does that leave us? Hopefully with a rejection of retribution, an embrace of reconciliation, and a willingness to consider what reparations might be appropriate to take a step to righting the wrongs done. All of this is hard work, but Jesus never said following would be easy. He told us it would be hard. Are you up for that hard work as a disciple of the One who did the hard work of reconciling us to God – even when it led him to the cross?

Disturbing news from Blue Ridge Poison Control Center: Calls related to vaping products increased by more than 35 percent last year. In 2020, the Center received just 20 vaping-related calls: By 2022, the number had risen to 73; in 2023 the tally was 99 vape-related calls, many of them child or adolescent-related. A scary statistic lurks behind these not-too-impressive numbers (the Center receives hundreds of medicine-related calls annually). The nicotine content of e-cigarettes is very high, with a single vape pen (e-cigarette) sometimes containing as much nicotine as 20 cigarettes. Worth noting: The FDA has approved only 23 e-cigarette products, all of them unflavored. The CDC reports that last year 2.1 million US middle and high school students used e-cigarettes; more than a half million of them were middle schoolers. A quarter of these students reported vaping daily, with almost 90 percent of them using the non-approved but easily purchased flavored e-cigarettes. In Virginia, advocacy group Tobacco Free Kids reports, 14.3 percent of all high school students use e-cigarettes, with just 2.8 percent smoking cigarettes. (The Central Shenandoah Health District would not provide local or regional numbers.) The Virginia Department of Health has assembled a comprehensive toolkit for anyone wanting to learn more about vaping. Find it at:

Online pharmacy safety has become a very big deal. At any given time, 35,000 online pharmacies are selling prescription medicines – and 95 percent of them are operating illegally. This slightly terrifying information comes from the Alliance for Safe Online Pharmacies (ASOP), a non-profit, global group working to eradicate the dangerous and mushrooming business of selling defective, out-of-date or otherwise unsafe medicines to unsuspecting patients. There are plenty of legitimate online pharmacies selling all sorts of prescriptions for far less than our regular insurance covers. (The most commonly bought meds are antidepressants, cancer drugs, painkillers and sexual aids, AARP reports.) Fortunately, online pharmacies can be checked out without too much difficulty. Start with the following four suggestions from the FDA. A legitimate online pharmacy will always:

- Require a doctor's prescription;
- Provide a physical address and telephone number in the U.S;
- Have a licensed pharmacist on staff to answer your questions; Be licensed with a state board of pharmacy.

The single most comprehensive resource I found comes from the Center for Safe Internet Pharmacies (CSIP), a nonprofit consortium of internet and e-commerce companies. https://safemedsonline.org/

The single most useful website I discovered is from ASOP. It includes easy-to-find ways to verify online pharmacies' legitimacy – and even has "please contact us" (the staff) features. https://asopfoundation.pharmacy/



FROM FAITH'S HEART — July 2024 Update

Part of missions work is connecting resources and people. In January, we learned from Millstone Child Recovery Foundation that there was an orphanage that housed both orphans and recovered victims of child trafficking in Uganda that was struggling to produce enough food on its farm to feed the children. We knew we had the knowledge to help them, but Uganda is on the other



side of the continent, so we called up our Equipping Farmers, International (EFI) buddies from Uganda who had been in our training group in Zimbabwe last year to see if they could help to provide the hands-on training in regenerative agriculture for the orphanage. And they did!

In early July, with Millstone helping to cover the costs, 20 orphanage staff and local farmers participated in a one-day training that included practicals in compost building, setting up a Pfumvudza plot, and preparing vegetable gardens. Two weeks later, two of the farm staff from the orphanage attended a full 5-day training at African Bible University in Uganda, where they were part of the very first batch of trainees to receive the International Certificate in Conservation Agriculture through Dordt University (Iowa) and EFI, certifying them as trainers in this holistic, Bible-based approach to farming. We are so excited to see the orphanage be able to feed the vulnerable children whom they minister to, and we are so honored that we could be a part of that.
